## NEWBURYPORT CHORAL SOCIETY CHORUS SURVEY November, 2019



Two notable passages are occurring for the Newburyport Choral Society (NCS) during the 2019 concert season -an historic 85th year anniversary of choral performance, and a search for a new Music Director commencing with the 2020-21 concert season. In marking these passages, NCS conducted a Chorus Survey of its members to acquire input that would guide the future of the chorus. The survey was designed to acquire feedback on significant aspects of NCS and on the qualities most valued by members in a new Music Director. There was a high participation rate in the survey process with 100 chorus members or 78% responding. The number of responses reflected an amazing balance across the sections: Altos-36; Sopranos-36; Basses-14; and Tenors-14.

## **HIGHLIGHTS OF SURVEY RESULTS**

Summarized below are highlights of Chorus member responses in the following four areas: 1) NCS Music; 2) Concert Program Recommendations; 3) NCS Rehearsals; 4) The New Music Director; and 5) NCS Programs and Traditions.

**NCS MUSIC:** Singers rated music preferences on a 4 point scale from most interesting to least interesting. The most striking finding of the survey was chorus members' widespread interest in performing a variety of music. Regarding music from different historical periods, nearly half or more of the singers rated masterpieces from the Classical/Romantic, Baroque, and 20<sup>th</sup> century periods as most interesting to them.

Singers also confirmed their continued interest in performing larger works with professional orchestra and soloists. Different types of music that the majority of the chorus rated as interesting or very interesting to them included opera choruses, a cappella pieces, early music (Renaissance), shorter pieces in different styles, spirituals, holiday music, and folk/cultural music. There was a spread of opinion about "Pop" type music (Broadway show tunes, jazz standards, Great American Song Book) with half the chorus indicating interest and half less interest.

**CONCERT PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS:** Chorus members were asked whether they agreed with concert program recommendations made by singers in the previous Chorus Survey conducted five years ago using a 4 point scale from Strongly Agree to Don't Agree. *The majority of responses reflected agreement with all recommendations with the percent of Strongly Agree shown below.* 

- 1. Continue to grow performance capabilities- every concert season demonstrates increased excellence (78%).
- 2. Continue to perform the masterworks and other high quality choral music that attracts audiences that love classical choral music, and educates audiences who are new to these works (73%).
- 3. Have a <u>variety</u> of different types of music performed in each concert pieces of music that will appeal to a broader audience mixed in with the classical choral works (55%).
- 4. Perform music that is best suited to our size and capability ---select music we are likely to perform best when concert programs are being planned (50%).
- 5. Perform new works where we work with the composer (27%).

**NCS REHEARSALS:** Singers rated the importance/helpfulness of rehearsal practices on a 4 point scale from very important/helpful to least important/helpful. *A high majority of singer responses reflected widespread support and appreciation for a variety of NCS rehearsal practices. These results underscored the value of current rehearsal* 

practices and that they should be continued in the future. The rehearsal practices that received the highest percentage of very important/helpful (4 point) ratings are noteworthy and shown below.

The remaining rehearsal practices that a majority of NCS members found helpful included warming up with physical movement, count-singing early in the rehearsal season, and learning about the historical and stylistic aspects of the music.

**THE NEW MUSIC DIRECTOR:** Singers were asked to rate the importance of qualities they would like to see in a new Music Director using a 4 point scale from Very Important/Essential to Not Important. *Responses indicated strong singer preferences for an outstanding teacher in demonstrating choral singing techniques, a skilled experienced conductor with the ability to move diverse amateur singers to high quality concert performance, and a leader with positive interpersonal skills and a charismatic and innovative vision.*

**NCS PROGRAMS & TRADITIONS:** Chorus members clearly value all of the NCS programs and traditions that have been established to engage the community and audiences. A high majority supported the Choral Society's emphasis on engaging children and youth, the audience "Carol Sing-Along," at the Winter Concert, the Summer Sing, and post-concert receptions. More than 60% also felt the Guest Conductor program at the Winter Concert should continue.
